Section 1: About the proposal

Title of Proposal

Introduce individual tenancy agreement for service users at House of Multiple Occupancy

Intended outcome of proposal

Promoting independence of service users with Mental Health conditions within their own tenancy and achieve an approximate annual budget saving of £9k

Description of proposal

At present the rent and council tax is fully funded by NHS Highland for 3 services users within a HMO in Lochgilphead. A breakdown of these costs for 2020/21: Rent Cost – £6,450.36 Council Tax Costs – £2,869.83

Following a discussion with the Housing Association, and additional service charge of £170 per month is anticipated for 2021/22 to cover the various costs of the HMO requirements. This will bring the total anticipated cost for rent and service charges for this property to £11,360.19.

Due to the needs of the service user group, it's anticipated that they will be eligible for a Council Tax exemption due to the property being occupied by residents who are severely mentally impaired.

Through the introduction of individual tenancy agreements, the service users will also be eligible for housing benefit which will cover the rent and service charges costs of the property, as opposed to the HSCP paying these costs in full.

The move to individual tenancy agreements will encourage the fuller independence of service users and will be considered their 'forever home', as opposed to the current temporary accommodation set up in place.

Service users will be supported by their existing Care Provider who currently provides Housing Support Services
